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Note from Founder Trustee

The Covid pandemic has changed the world forever. Everyone everywhere experienced an unprecedented crisis where neither wealth nor power offered any protection. However, poor communities were driven to desperation. Sahyog attempted its best to support such communities by organizing relief.

We were also witness to the resilience and courage with which these communities pulled themselves out of the crisis and rebuild their lives. With the knowledge that the long-term impact would soon become visible; we launched several new initiatives in 2021-23.

We expanded our home library programme with the knowledge that children had lost almost two valuable years of schooling and were struggling to learn. We tried to reach as many students in higher education as possible with financial aid so that their careers were not jeopardized.

Within Sahyog itself, there was a new spirit at work. Our relief work had brought us in touch with a much wider community. We

had earned the support of many new local organisations and groups. As the pandemic receded, we were able to spring back quickly with their support and even expand our activities.

In the summer of 2022, we moved into two large community centres, which offered us the opportunity to organize many more activities and reach out to many more people. As a result, each programme has seen unprecedented growth in the numbers of participants and activities. Even as we celebrated the freedom of having more space, we did not lose sight of the fact that our programmes need to move outwards deeper into the community and closer to people's homes.

Sahyog Sangharsh initiated an outreach programme where remedial education and therapy could be provided at satellite centres. We continued to use online mode for providing inputs, engaging a wider circle of volunteers and resources persons and reaching those who could not come to our centres.

We are very happy and proud to present the annual report for 2021-23 documenting the work of a stronger and more resilient Sahyog.

Sahyog Roshan Community Library



Supported by Empower

Roshan is a Mobile Library program for Children ages 6 to 15yrs, which focuses on quiet reading, storytelling sessions and book-based activities and events. Roshan encourages children to develop a love for language and companionship with books.

No of Beneficiaries 2021-2023 Kurla- 164 Ghatkopar- 521 Home Libraries- 17 Home Librarians- 15 No of Books Borrowed 2021-22: 3775 2022- 23: 5085 No of Champions: 48 In 2021, the program began to revive in the offline mode, the children were eager to take part in the invigorating experiences at the home libraries. The team re-structured the intervention to create an enriching space for the children with read aloud activities, rendezvous with authors and other resource persons, and enrichment camps. Social emotional learning became an important aspect to be introduced with the children post Covid.

The expansion to Bail Bazaar, Kurla site in 2022, the library was welcomed by a new community. As the home libraries expanded in both the sites, there was also a surge in the number of books borrowed by the children in the home libraries. Older members of the library have taken on responsibility for the libraries and they assist the team in the sessions in the community.

Collaboration & capacity building with other NGOs were at its peak. The Roshan library program module was appreciated and introduced to other NGOs. Parag Library came on board as capacity building partner, to develop a training module for the home librarians and strengthen their skills, along with a year long mentoring. The Roshan core team expanded their knowledge participating in other training programs conducted by other resource centres and institutes.

Sahyog Sangharsh

Community Disability Intervention Centre



Supported by Wipro Ltd

Sangharsh caters to the education and rehabilitation needs of children and adolescents with disabilities. The primary objective of Sangharsh was to make the children and adolescent self-reliant, enabling them to lead useful lives and be more integrated in the community where they live.

Initiated since 2003

Current Operational Site: Asalpha, Ghatkopar since 2022 & Bail Bazaar, Kurla since 2023

No of Beneficiaries June 21 to May 2022- 36 June 22 to May 2023- 63 The early intervention & identification work with local Anganwadi's and health centres, was showing results, in this period, our attempt to identify and intervene early was very successful and we saw an increase in the number of children from 0 to 6 years. With this change in the profile of the children, we needed to change our strategy and offer more decentralised

services. Young children cannot be separated from their parents. We also have to work more closely with them as they are key to the child's rehabilitation. This led us to establish satellite centres, which worked closely with the caregivers on early intervention and enlisted a team of

paraworkers from the community.

Sahyog Sangharsh Highlights



The collaborations with vocational training institutes and

networking in the community provided opportunities for apprenticeship and enrolment in vocational training centres, as we also saw a rise in the number of young adults approaching the Sangharsh centre. The program relocated to a bigger space at Asalpha, Ghatkopar and Bail Bazaar in 2022. This enabled us to admit more students and conduct more activities on early intervention and pre-vocational training.

Our consultant therapists were also facilitated by the additional space and facilities. Involvement of the community has been strengthened through one-to-one engagement between children with disabilities and community stakeholders in the form of social support visits, tutorial support, and community events. Disability week was celebrated at both the locations in different community spaces, bringing together all Sahyog's programmes demonstrating more visibly our culture of inclusion and diversity. Caregivers' participation in the intervention of their children has been spirited, and seen in their commitment to the home programme and willingness to follow through the lengthy certification process.



SAM (Scholarship & Mentorship): There has seen a surge in the number of students applying for the scholarship in the span of these 2 yrs. We have witnessed the students continuing with their education, instead of dropping out due to the support given. In most cases, where grades were the only criteria for selection of students for scholarship.

Sahyog has set a precedent in acknowledging the family background and individual students' issues irrespective of the grade, thus giving them an opportunity to pursue their education and get closer to their goals.

Sahyog Jhula



The Gender sessions initially began to be offered online and later transitioned to offline mode post covid. To bring more diversity and customization of the sessions, the Gender team was formed consisting of one staff member representing each of Sahyog's community programs. This gave the scope for the team to sharpen their facilitation skills and also provided a perspective from the beneficiaries' point of view to make the sessions more applicable.

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Although the sessions began with movie discussions, it later led to the incorporation of different art forms like drawing, poem, stories, craft activity etc. The sessions became more interactive and these alternative forms of

engagement appeared to be more effective in eliciting the responses from the community. The sessions were also extended to the Sahyog staff, who were happy to be part of this, reminiscing the time when they were students attending the Jhula sessions. One can see the influence of Jhula in the manner in which the team has been putting across their opinions and ideas concerning their own life and world around them.
